Hope Hollow is a nonprofit, charitable organization providing complimentary lodging, meals, transportation assistance and emotional support to persons with cancer, and their loved ones, who are financially in need while coming to Columbus, Ohio, for their cancer treatment.

STORY OF HOPE HOLLOW

Jane Jacquemin-Clark and Kevin Clark founded Hope Hollow after Jane survived two cancers and lost her mother and aunt to pancreatic cancer. The couple felt called to live the gratitude for Jane's life and to honor those they loved who died of cancer.

"Some of the situations we've encountered are heart-wrenching," says Kevin. "Cancer patients and their families sometimes sleep in their cars, do not have money for food and are uncertain how they will have the gas money to get back home. Hope Hollow is here to help when people need it most."

When Jenny Turner and her husband, Chris, needed support during her treatment at The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – James Cancer Hospital and Solove Research Institute for breast cancer, Jane and Kevin not only welcomed them to stay in their home but provided critical emotional support.



"Jane hugged me and held me and was just the most comforting person," says Jenny, who endured a major health scare before starting her chemotherapy. "It was like having family here that couldn't come from back home."
